World Geography PSP

0207

This course is designed to provide students with factual knowledge of world geography and analytical skills to deal critically with the issues studied. Writing skills are also emphasized.

AP World History

0204

AP World History is designed to be the equivalent of a two-semester introductory college or university world history course. In AP World History students investigate significant events, individuals, developments, and processes in six historical periods from approximately 8000 B.C.E. to the present. Students develop and use the same skills, practices, and methods employed by historians: analyzing primary and secondary sources; developing historical arguments; making historical comparisons; and utilizing reasoning about contextualization, causation, and continuity and change over time. The course provides five themes that students explore throughout the course in order to make connections among historical developments in different times and places: interaction between humans and the environment; development and interaction of cultures; state building, expansion, and conflict; creation, expansion, and interaction of economic systems; and development and transformation of social structures.

TYPE: Advanced Placement

World History PSP

0209

This in-depth course is a study of man's development from prehistory to the twentieth century. This course, which stresses western heritage, as it investigates all cultures from around the world, emphasizes higher-level thinking and writing skills.

United States History PSP

0201

This course is a survey of U.S History from the Post-Reconstruction period following the Civil War to the present. Topics studied are Reconstruction, Westward Movement in America, the Agrarian Revolution, the Progressive Movement, Imperialism, World War I, the Twenties, the Great Depression, World War II, and major foreign and domestic problems of the 50's through the present.

1201

This course is similar to U.S. History PSP course in that it has the same curriculum but has been differentiated to meet the academic needs of advanced high school students. United States History Dual Credit

2019

This course will meet the requirements for High School US History and History 1301 and 1302 for Paris Junior College.

COURSE NOTE: Must meet all admission requirements to Paris Junior College. Tuition is to be paid to Paris Junior College. HIST 1301/1302 = 6 college hours

United States Government PSP

0213

Government is a study of the United States federal and constitutional system; executive, judicial, and legislative powers, and institutions; the United States Constitution, Bill of Rights and related cases, influences, history, and formation of governments, including state government. Study of U.S. political parties and ideologies; federal and international relations; close study of various current problems.

CREDIT: 0.5

United States Government CP

0233

This course is similar to US Govt PSP course in that it has the same curriculum but has been differentiated to meet the academic needs of advanced high school students. This course will require that students do more reading outside of class and that they be able to produce written products. They will also be required to write comprehensible essays.

Economics CP

2212

Economics with Emphasis on the Free Enterprise System and Its Benefits is the culmination of the economic content and concepts studied from Kindergarten through required secondary courses. The focus is on the basic principles concerning production, consumption, and distribution of goods and services (the problem of scarcity) in the United States and a comparison with those in other countries around the world. Students analyze the interaction of supply, demand, and price. Students will investigate the concepts of specialization and international trade, economic growth, key economic measurements, and monetary and fiscal policy. Students will study the roles of the Federal Reserve System and other financial institutions, government, and businesses in a free enterprise system. Types of business ownership and market structures are discussed. The course also incorporates instruction in personal financial literacy. Students apply critical-thinking skills using economic concepts to evaluate the costs and benefits of economic issues.

2213

This course will provide students with an in depth look at America's economics system. Through various activities that emphasize both written and oral skills, the student will develop a broad comprehension of Microeconomics in today's world.

United States Government Dual Credit

9213

This course combines the study of high school US Government curriculum with Paris Junior College Government 2305 course. This is a survey of the United States constitutional systems: executive, judicial, and legislative. Emphasis is on foreign and military policies, economics and financial developments, political parties and ideologies, bureaucracies, and the impact of public opinion, pressure groups, and mass media on elections. World Affairs are stressed with respect to their impact on the United States.

COURSE NOTE: Must meet all admission requirements to Paris Junior College. Tuition is to be paid to Paris Junior College. GOVT 2305 = 3 college hours

CREDIT: 0.5

TYPE: Honors

GRADE: 12

Economics Dual Credit

9313

This course combines the study of high school Economics curriculum with Paris Junior College Economics 2301. This course is an introduction to the study of general economic principles. Such topics as economic systems, demand and supply, business organizations, gross national product, unemployment, inflation, fiscal policy, monetary policy, interest rates, and business cycles are discussed. Macroeconomics and current economics are emphasized.

COURSE NOTE: Must meet all admission requirements to Paris Junior College. Tuition is to be paid to Paris Junior College. ECON 2301 = 3 college hours

Psychology

0217

Psychology is the study of animal and human behavior. The course includes an overview of theories, human development, and mental disabilities.

COURSE NOTE: This course is usually taken in conjunction with Sociology.

Sociology is the study of the origin, development, organization, and functioning of human society. This includes the science of the fundamental laws of social relations and institutions.
